RELIGIOUS AFFILIATION AND PERCEPTIONS & ATTITUDES INVOLVING DOMESTIC VIOLENCE

Abstract

The purpose of this study was to determine if there is a difference between 1) religious affiliation and 2) perceptions and attitudes involving domestic violence among African American business leaders. This study utilized a correlational design and a cross-sectional survey. Forty-three African American business leaders who worked in northern Florida (USA) were surveyed. Data were collected by using the Perceptions of and Attitudes toward Domestic Violence Questionnaire. ANOVA was performed on the data and the results indicate that religious affiliation made no difference on the perceptions and attitudes involving domestic violence among African American business leaders.
